Snail Mailed Newsletters Final Notice

Hi, Everyone. As we are experiencing difficulty in our Members providing us with an Email Address or request for receiving a hard copy of the Newsletter, this will be our last attempt at notifying everyone. At present, we only have 202 people identified to receive a hard copy, of which 57 or those are Libraries or other organizations. That's okay for now, as we have to have at least 200 to get our Bulk Mail Rate. Please remember that a Newsletter being mailed to an address in the 313 zip code costs a tad over .29 cents, while one being mailed outside the 313 zip code costs almost .32 cents. Just mailing this \quarter is going to cost \$360. Furthermore, if that Newsletter is returned to us, we are charged another .29 or .32 cents as the case may dictate. With only 202 hard copies, added to 550 or so emailed copies, that means that we have almost 1200 people who have probably not received an email at all in the past few years. I have a problem with that, as I personally feel that EVERYONE in our Society should receive one! Subsequently, for me to ensure that everyone receives a newsletter this quarter, I will need to mail (i.e. "snail mail") about 1275 newsletters to physical addresses, some of which may no longer be valid. Remember that we are charged again for returned mail. The cost for sending out 1275 newsletters is basically going to cost the Society \$490.25 per quarter, or almost \$2,000 per year, and quite frankly, we can't afford that. Please find it in your heart to simply provide us with an email address of some sort, so that we can send you an Electronic Newsletter, which not only costs us anything, but your Newsletter will be in color as well! You can email me at scotti3275@aol.com or mail to Newsletter Editor, 2980 Ebenezer Road, Rincon GA 31326. Additionally, if everyone would like to contribute an extra \$5-10, strictly for Newsletter use, that would be great. We're really trying to get snail mails down to a more manageable level, perhaps around 400, and I think that all would agree that a Library or Educational Institution should only receive electronic versions. We are in the 21st Century now, and as much as I sometimes hate it, we are certainly now technologically oriented. Thank you for your attention to this matter. - Scotty Scott

Speaker: Christine Marie Koch

The Georgia Salzburger Society was honored to welcome Christine Koch of Paderborn University in Halle (Saale), Germany as the Keynote Speaker at Jerusalem Lutheran Church on 17 Feb 2018 at 2:00 p.m. Having received her teaching degree in History and English in the United States, Christine is currently a Doctoral Candidate in American Studies. She is from Salzkotten, a small the University. town near The name "Salzkotten" is derived from German language, meaning "salt and small village or assembly of houses". There is a saline, as



well as two water mills in Salzotten, along with many houses from the Middle Ages within the town limits. Christine notes that it is "just funny that this town and the city where I currently live in Halle; both have to do with salt and here I am working on the Salzburgers!"

Christine spends much of her time studying in the archives of the Francke Foundation in Halle, preparing her Ph. D. Dissertation, which mainly consists of a longitudinal study on what became of the Georgia Salzburgers after the American Revolution, with special regard to what it means to be a Georgia Salzburger descendant, and their continued transatlantic connections.

Christine's presentation will reflect on the current state of her research, to include insights from archival documents concerning Halle and Georgia, as well as a brief discussion on her most recent trip to Salzburg, Austria.
