When a Georgia Salzburger descendant hears the name Jacob Gnann, the immediate question that comes to mind is "Which one?" There are numerous men in Effingham's colonial period named Jacob Gnann. The confusion surrounding some of these Jacobs can be clarified using primary documents.

Jacob Gnann, who arrived on the Third Swabian Transport, was married to Maria Margaretha (Arnsdorff) Deppe on January 23, 1759. Rev. Boltzius makes references to him in the Detailed Reports, so we know of Jacob's arrival and his marriage. The Ebenezer Record Book states the birthdates of his children as: Johannes (John), April 23, 1760; Jonathan, Sep-



tember 30, 1762; David, September 28, 1764; Jacob, September 21, 1766; and Dorothea, March 23, 1769. The Ebenezer Record Book also tells us that this Jacob Gnann died October 13, 1773 and was buried the next day.

Jacob Gnann, the son of Johann George and Anna (Gress) Gnann, was born December 25, 1747 and baptized later in the day according to his baptism record at Evangelische Kirche Langenau (OA. Ulm). He arrived in Georgia as a young boy in 1751. He married Hanna Metzger on April 6, 1773 according to the Ebenezer Record Book and their marriage license on file in our county. Jacob and Hanna (Metzger) Gnann had two daughters, Elisabeth and Margaret. We find their births listed in the Ebenezer Record Book as December 19, 1773 and November 26, 1778, respectively. The Germans of Colonial Georgia index shows this Jacob died in 1814.

A great number of faithful men and women have preceded us; therefore, we are compassed about by a great crowd of witnesses. In our genealogical research, I believe those witnesses are primary sources. We must use them to set our records straight.~ Erika Bragg

Salzburger Heritage Research Committee members will research:

- Genealogy of Georgia Salzburgers and allied families.
- Towns, districts, regions, or states from which Salzburgers and allied families emigrated.
- Colonial settlements to which Salzburger and allied families originally immigrated before moving to Effingham.
- German culture and traditions in Georgia.
- Illnesses, epidemics, or pandemics that affected Salzburger settlements.
- Industry.
- Agriculture and crops.
- Churches planted.
- Land grants and/or transfers through purchase or inheritance.
- Navionics, the waterways of Effingham.
- Cemeteries and burial sites related to Georgia Salzburgers and their descendants.
- Interviews for family history .

The Committee's research will focus on the above-mentioned statements of purpose; however, the members are not limited to researching only in these areas. Any GSS member interested in doing research using primary sources may join our new Salzburger Heritage Research Committee. BLOOMING TREASURES

Amaryllis bulbs originally from the flower garden of Annie Helmly Kessler have been donated by her granddaughter Mary Ann Kessler Berry. Over forty years

ago, six large bulbs were a gift to Mary Ann from her aunt Ila Kessler Zeigler at the family Christmas gift exchange. These bulbs became the gift that kept on giving. They were planted at the Berrys' first home in Winter Park, Florida. The bulbs multiplied to become a beautiful bed of red and peppermint blooms in the spring. Later the bulbs moved with Mary Ann, Franklin, and Jennie to the Berry family farm in Bowling Green, Kentucky where they spent the next 30 years. The bulbs had to be dug up each fall and then replanted each spring due to the harsher winter weather. The bulbs liked



the sandy soil beds created just for them. They multiplied and multiplied taking over most of the courtyard garden space. As Mary Ann and Franklin approached retirement several years ago, arthritis made it difficult to take care of the bulbs. Mary Ann offered amaryllises to family members so that many people could enjoy the bulbs and carry on the Grandma Annie amaryllis tradition. That winter, she boxed up 15 groupings of bulbs totaling well over a hundred bulbs. She was overwhelmed by all the notes and photos she received of beautiful blooming amaryllises from all over the South. When Mary Ann and Franklin moved to Oregon to be near their daughter Jennie, their son-in law Ravi, and their grandchildren Maya and Nathan, they took with them the remaining bulbs. She planted about ten at their house and the others at her daughter's house. After taking them up for the winter, they discovered that many of the bulbs had been damaged or destroyed by local grub worms. Later that fall, Patsy Shearouse Zeigler (daughter-in-law of Ila Zeigler) and Ruth Kessler Dostal (daughter of Vaden Kessler) asked if Mary Ann had any of Grandma Annie's amaryllis bulbs left to plant at Ebenezer. She recounted her tale of woe, and asked if they would still like to have them. Gill and Patsy Zeigler, their daughter April Pilcher, and her children Mason, Colt, and Sadie, and Ruth Dostal, and her granddaughter Samantha prepared the beds and planted the bulbs that had traveled from East Coast to West and back to finally find themselves at rest back home. With the spring rains, they are reported to be doing well.

When you visit Ebenezer, be sure to stop and take a look at the amaryllises planted in front of the museum and parsonage. $\sim Patsy Zeigler$ 6
