As part of our Heritage Day Festival in September, the Georgia Salzburger Society is pleased to host as our keynote speaker, Dr. Russell C. Kleckley.

Dr. Kleckley, (Doctor of Theology, 1990, University of Munich), is Professor of Religion Emeritus at Augsburg University in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He has edited, translated, and published many works that are important to Georgia Salzburger history.

Dr. Kleckley's translations include:

## Zipperer Genealogy Update

In the fall of 2021, the Salzburger Heritage Research Committee held a virtual meeting to discuss important findings related to Peter

Zipperer. At the conclusion of the meeting, the research committee voted to recommend updating the genealogy of the Zipperer family.

On February 12, 2022, the GSS Board heard these recommendations and voted to recognize Peter Zipperer as the correct



Georgia Salzburger immigrant ancestor. The original genealogy named Christian Zipperer as the immigrant and labeled Peter as Christian's son. This change was an important step to take and had to be backed by substantial historical records.

Peter Zipperer was baptized on August 6, 1705, in Bernstadt, a town in modern day Baden-Württemberg, Germany. He married Ursula Fischer, and their son Christian was baptized December 14, 1733. On April 9, 1751, Peter requested permission from the authorities to leave the Territory of the Imperial City of Ulm. He came to Georgia with the Second Swabian Transport in October of that same year.

Peter lived in Georgia, held land in Georgia, and died in Georgia. Christian Zipperer was named the administrator of Peter's estate on October 2, 1767. The estate inventory was filed on January 21, 1768.

Peter was not the son of Christian Zipperer as shown in Georgia Salzburger genealogy. Peter was Christian's father, and as such is the patriarch of the Zipperer family in Georgia.

Twelve of these stanzas (omitting stanzas 9 and 14) are much as they are found in: The Salzburgers and Their Descendants: Being the history of a colony of German (Lutheran) Protestants, who emigrated to Georgia in 1734, and settled at Ebenezer, twenty-five miles above the city of Savannah. By Rev. P. A. Strobel, of the South Carolina Synod, and Principal of the Female Institute, Americus, Georgia

(Baltimore: T. Newton Kurtz, 1855). This excellent old historical account of our Salzburger community (up to the 1850s) is available in our Museum Gift Shop, with a discount for members of our society.

Here is the German first stanza, paired with the <u>rhythmic</u> version of its tune in the key of D Maior (note the lilting triplets of the 3<sup>rd</sup> line):



German organist, court conductor, and music scholar **Michael Prætorius (Michael Schultheiß** 1571-1621), composed that tune in 1610, likely based on an older melody. The tune is named for its initial association with Prætorius' own 1610 hymn text **Ich dank Dir schon durch deinen Sohn** (*I thank Thee ever through Thy Son*). We use that <u>rhythmic</u> version of the tune (in triple meter); the classic 1941 Lutheran hymnal uses an <u>isometric</u> version (in compound meter), in the key of D b Major, as a setting for the 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm (*The King of Love My Shepherd Is*, Henry W. Baker's paraphrase, 1868).



Spollight on the Loest Research Library

The Loest Research Library welcomes Dylan Edward Mulligan as librarian. Mulligan, an attorney in his native Glennville, holds a B.A. in History with a minor in political science from Georgia Southern University and a Juris Doctor from the University of Georgia School of Law. He is a direct descendant of Martin Dasher, and through that line, he is also a direct descendant of the Zittrauer, Groover, Schweighofer, and Meyer families. Mulligan is perhaps best known across the Southeast as "The Georgia Sandman," for the elaborate sandcastles and sculptures which he has constructed on the Georgia and Florida coasts for many years. ~ Kristin Everson 8



## THE EXILE SONG—CONCLUSION

At our two yearly gatherings, our society commemorates the travails of our Salzburger forefathers of 1731 by singing the first stanza of their *Exile Song*, their legacy from a pious Salzburger exile of 45 years earlier (1686), Please see our newsletters of Summer 2021 for the history of its writing, and of Winter 2022 for the hymn's meaning. Here, we'll read one translation of the hymn's full text, as well as consider its tune.

Our hymnist, **Joseph Schaitberger**, used a hymn tune already known to "*his children*" for singing his German text. For each four line stanza, that tune alternates eight and seven syllables per line (expressed as Meter 87.87); a literal translation into English would not likely fit that tune pattern. Thus, various translations amend and alter the text (but hopefully not its meaning) to poetically wed text to tune.

#### A literal translation of the first two stanzas:

1. Ich bin ein armer Exulant —	1. I am a poor exile —
Also muß ich mich schreiben —	So I have to write of me —
Man tut mich aus dem Vaterland	Man does me out of the fatherland
Um Gottes Wort vertreiben.	To drive out God's Word.
2. Doch weiß ich wohl, Herr Jesu mein,	2. But know I well, Lord Jesus mine,
Es ist dir auch so gangen.	It was for you also the same.
Jetzt soll ich dein Nachfolger sein;	Now shall I your successor be;
Mach's Herr, nach dei'm Verlangen	Do it Lord, according to your desire.
A metered (singable) translation of the 14 stanzas (four lines each):	

1. I am a wretched exile here— So must my name be written— From Fatherland and all that's dear, For God's word, I am driven.

2. Full well I know, Lord Jesus Christ, Thy treatment was no better, Thy follower I now will be; To do Thy will I'm debtor.

3. And now a pilgrim I must be, In foreign climes must wander. Oh Lord, my prayer ascends to Thee That Thou my path will ponder.

4. O faithful God! be Thou my stay; I give me to Thy keeping; Forsake me not in this my day, Nor when in death I'm sleeping.

5. Thy faith I freely have confessed: Dare I deny it? Never! Although they call me "heretic," And soul and body sever.

6. My ornament, the galling chain; For Jesus' sake I wear it, And scarcely feel its weight or pain, While in His faith I bear it.

7. Though Satan and the world conspire To seize each earthly treasure, If in my heart true faith but dwell, I'm rich beyond all measure, 8. God ! I submit now to Thy will, With you I now must stay. To do Thy will I do desire To patiently obey.

9. If I had to move to misery, I could not e'er resist. I pray that in that far-off place God grant me sweet friendship.

10. Now I depart in poverty, In God's name I am going; And one day I will surely wear The crown of heaven glowing.

11. Forth from my home I now must go : My children! Must I leave them? O God! my tears in Anguish flow — Shall I no more receive them?

12. O lead me God unto that place Though in some distant nation, Where I may have Thy glorious Word and learn Thy great salvation.
13. And though in this dark vale of tears I yet awhile must tarry, I know that Thou to heaven, at length, My ransomed soul will carry!
14. The one who made this little song,

Nameless shall he remain; He openly accepted Christ, But the Pope's word he defamed. 5


Patsy and Erika showed the students the church and the museum, and Jennifer volunteered on her day off to do an archaeology demonstration.
