GSS Museum Apdate

The GSS Museum has received its first shipment of *The Letters of Johann Ernst Bergmann, Ebenezer, Georgia, 1786-1824*. The long-awaited, highly-anticipated book was published in the spring of 2022 and was a joint project of the GSS with the Francke Foundations in Halle.

Dr. Russell C. Kleckley has done a fantastic work with this translation, as we all knew he would. He has included a large amount of background material and provided plenty of references to help readers more fully understand the content and its context.

There is so much information to glean from these 500+ pages. Readers will learn the history of the post-Revolutionary War Ebenezer, a period in our history that is relatively unknown to us. The devastation of the town of Ebenezer and the fate of its residents is well-documented.

We learn Bergmann's thoughts on important American leaders, such as Washington, Adams, and Jefferson. We also learn of the pastor's interactions with Georgia leaders and clergymen.

The long-lasting conflict between Triebner and Rabenhorst and their factions is fully explained. We also learn, most of us for the first time, of the matter of the Rabenhorst estate.

Pastor Bergmann wrote a letter detailing the death of Theobald Kieffer. Dr. Kleckley is the first scholar to consider the possibility that this letter was referring to Theobald Kieffer II, the son of Theobald Kieffer of Purrysburg. We can read Bergmann's account of Kieffer's death and Dr. Kleckley's footnotes on the event. There is also a great deal of new genealogical material in this book. We learn more about:

Heritage Day Speaker: Dr. Russell C. Kleckley

Dr. Russell C. Kleckley will be the keynote speaker at our Heritage Day Festival. Dr. Kleckley (Doctor of Theology, 1990, University of Munich) is Professor of



Religion Emeritus at Augsburg University in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He has edited, translated, and published many works that are important to Georgia Salzburger history.

Here is a glimpse into the scope of Dr. Kleckley's work: The Letters of Johann Martin Boltzius, Lutheran Pastor in Ebenezer, Georgia, is a set of two volumes published in 2009. These books are comprised of 157 letters written by Ebenezer's first pastor with the final letter (158) written by Christian Rabenhorst telling of the death of Pastor Boltzius.

Dr. Hermann Winde's The Early History of the Lutheran Church in Georgia, was originally written in 1960 when Dr. Winde was a doctoral candidate at the Martin Luther University Halle-Wittenberg. Dr. Kleckley translated this "comprehensive representation" into English, and publication took place in 2021.

Read more about Dr. Kleckley's newest translation The Letters of Johann Ernst Bergmann, Ebenezer, Georgia, 1786-1824, in this newsletter.

The soon-to-be-published Salzburger transport project focuses on the four transports responsible for bringing religious refugees from the Archbishopric of Salzburg to Ebenezer in Georgia in 1734, 1735, 1736, and 1741.

Dr. Kleckley is scheduled to make his presentation on Monday at 11 a.m.

He will explain: Who Johann Ernst Bergmann was.

What Bergmann has shown us.

The process of translating the work from concept to creation to conclusion.

Due to the fact that a great deal of new information has been revealed to English speakers through this publication, Dr. Kleckley will open the floor for discussion at the conclusion of his presentation. ~ Erika Bragg

Spolight on the Loest Research Library

The Loest Research Library committee has acquired a large number of items that have recently been added to the library's holdings. These acquisitions include ten new books, one booklet, two articles, an estates binder, and numerous documents.

Two books, Salzburg: A Synthesis of Art and Nature, were donated by Mrs. Herta Westreicher Funk, a native of Salzburg. The committee voted to purchase several books with the library funds. Those books are: The Letters of Johann Ernst Bergmann, Ebenezer, Georgia, 1786-1824 by Russell C. Kleckley, Marriages and Deaths 1763 to 1820 and Marriages and Deaths 1820 to 1830 by Mary Bondurant Warren, 1805 Georgia Land Lottery Persons Entitled to Draw and 1807 Georgia Land Lottery Fortunate Drawers and Grantees by Paul K. Graham, Third or 1820 Land Lottery of Georgia by S. Emmett Lucas, Jr., and Eighteenth Century Emigrants from the Northern Alsace to America by Annette Kunselman Burgert. A copy of The Dead Towns of Georgia by Charles C. Jones, Jr. was donated.

"Finding Christoph Heinrich Mueller" is an article written by Dr. Kai Dose detailing his important research into the identity of the artist of the drawings previously attributed to Baron von Reck. "Ophthalmology in North America: Early Stories (1491-1801)" by Christopher T. Leffler, et al, references the eye problems suffered by Ebenezer's Pastor Boltzius. "Three Bacher Families in Colonial Ebenezer, Georgia" by Paul A. Ritter, a GSS member and Bacher descendant, is very useful in sorting out the confusion about the three Bacher families. An Estate Records Binder has been compiled and includes estate information on about a dozen families.

Two of the documents added are The Church in Bethany and the Zipperer Board Action. All fifteen of the others are photocopies obtained from University of Georgia Digital Library.

The Loest Library's old computer recently crashed and was unsalvageable. The committee used the library funds to purchase a new computer and organizing software, which will serve the library for many years to come. One generous



donation has been made to help offset the expense of this big purchase. If anyone would like to help by donating to the Loest Research Library, please mark your check "LRL computer" and mail to the GSS office.

Our Salzburger Composer, "Cousin" Wolfgang

Mozart (né **Wolfgangus Theophilus**) was born in the German Archbishopric-Principality of Salzburg on Tuesday, 27 January 1756, the Feast Day of St. John Chrysostom; his baptismal name **Joannes Chrysostomus** was prefixed the following day at St. Rupert's



Cathedral. **Theophilus** (Greek "Lover/Beloved of God") was variously rendered as **Amadeus** (Latin), **Amadeo** (Italian), **Amadè** (French) and **Gottlieb** (German). An All Hallows Eve confirmation gave him yet another: **Sigismundus**.

His beloved (after God comes Papa) scholarly father, Leopold (1719-1787), born in Augsburg to a family of builders, became a violinist in the court of the Prince-Archbishop of Salzburg. He composed, conducted, taught music and violin, and published a violin textbook. In 1747, Leopold married a Salzburger, Anna Maria (née Pertl, 1720–1778). Two of seven babies survived infancy, Maria Anna

"Naner!" (1751-1829), and "Wolferl," musical prodigies both. Leopold homeschooled them in academic disciplines as well as languages and music. During European exhibition tours, the children performed before royalty, Wolferl beginning at age eight; they were exposed to a variety of cultures and musical styles.

Mozart played harpsichord at age four, and composed at five. At eight he published two sonatas, at nine he composed his first symphony, at eleven his first piano concerto, at twelve his first opera. He was the Archbishop's Concertmaster at 14. At age 25, he left for Vienna, in neighboring Austria, where, in 1782, he married a German singer, *Constanza* (née *Weber*, 1762-1842); their six children were born 1783-1791. Mozart produced 600 compositions; his works for voice involved speaking, understanding and tailoring his compositions to French, German, Italian and Latin texts (he also spoke English). Mozart died at 35 at home in Vienna on Monday 5 December 1791.

Mozart was born in the German principality of his mother's family, which would not become a part of Austria until Napoleonic times, more than a decade after his death, and more than seven decades after our ancestors were expelled from Salzburg. Mozart's paternal family had originated in Swabia/Bavaria; thus, Mozart may also be our very distant cousin through German lines of the Ebenezer community other than those of our Salzburger exiles. ~ JohnRobert Peavy
