December and January have been busy months for contractors completing repairs to GSS buildings.

The parsonage was painted with fresh coats of paint including the shutters, porches, and ramp.

In December and January, employees of Landmark Preservation completed work on the windows of the Fail House and its kitchen. All 18



windows were reglazed. Some were removed so that work could be done to stabilize the windows. A few sashes that had rotted were replaced.



In January, HVAC technicians removed the old insulation from the parsonage ductwork and reinstalled new insulation. This was an important step to take to help the HVAC system run more efficiently. ~ Erika Bragg

The Most Important Word

In an 1802 letter to Pastor Nebe of the German School in Halle, Pastor Johann Ernst Bergmann first wrote about the details surrounding the death of Theobald Kieffer. Bergmann also described the death of John Adam Treutlen in a later letter.

These two letters were possibly his most significant and were first translated into English decades ago. Because of the translations,

Georgia Salzburgers have long known about the circumstances of the deaths of these important men in Ebenezer's history. There was only one man named John Adam Treutlen, but that was not the case with the name Theobald Kieffer. For years, there has been confusion over the identity of the Theobald who died after being beaten by Stamp Act protestors.


Theobald's death was recorded in the *Ebenezer Record Book*. "Joh. Theobald Kieffer, an important member of Ebenezer congregation and a faithful deacon of the same, entered into his rest Dec. 7, 1766, and received Christian burial on the 8th with the attendance of many members of the congregation."

Theobald's last will and testament was recorded on February 25, 1767. Pastor Christian Rabenhorst testified to the fact that he saw Theobald alive at the end of November of 1766. Theobald's estate was appraised on April 28, 1767.

Which Theobald was still alive in November 1766? Which Theobald died in December 1766? Whose will was recorded in February 1767? Whose estate was appraised in April 1767?

Pastor Boltzius kept a journal during the months of August and September 1763. In an entry dated August 23, 1763, Boltzius referred to the elder Theobald Kieffer of Purryburg as *verstorbener*, which means deceased. Again on September 26, 1763, Boltzius referred to the older Kieffer as being deceased.

All of the confusion over the identity of the Theobald Kieffer who died at the hands of Stamp Act protestors can be put to rest. Theobald Kieffer II was the victim of those "wild rabble-rousers" because his father, Theobald Kieffer I, was already dead in 1763. One important word proves that fact: *verstorbener*. ~ Erika Bragg



LOEST LIBRARY AND YOU: A PATH TO DISCOVERY



Greetings and welcome to 2023! As we move along into this new year, I want to invite everyone to visit us at the Loest Research Library (LRL) here at Ebenezer, Georgia. Many of you who are reading this right now may be aware of your Salzburger connection with your ancestors; however, you might not have all of the individual names necessary to fill up your family tree. We want to help you fix that!

The LRL is the clearinghouse for all things involving Salzburger genealogy. Our records go back to the beginnings of Ebenezer, Georgia in 1734, and in some cases, the records go all the way back to the archives in Europe. As one of the researchers at the LRL, I am often asked why knowing about our family history is so important. Genealogy is a journey of self-discovery. As you learn about your ancestors and who they were, you learn more and more about who you are. I find that learning about my ancestors as individuals — as people, not 'just' names — that I become much more connected to them than I could have imagined. While we certainly don't have all of the answers, we do have the tools necessary to get you on your way to a lifetime of discovery.

I am very interested in getting our young people more involved. I very seldom see visitors between 12 and 30 years old. The question is always pretty much the same. "Why should I care what happened to dead relatives 100's of years ago?" Well, more than ever, young — and not so young — people need to know where we came from. Knowing, recording, and preserving your family history directly impacts you, your family, and even future generations of people you may never know. The more we discover about our past, the greater a connection we feel to our ancestors. With the advent of DNA sequencing, those from our past become more important than ever.

We want you to come and visit Ebenezer, walk the grounds where Revolutionary War patriots walked, where Civil War battles were waged, where burials in 'our' cemetery go back over 200 years. Walk through the Fail House, built of heart pine in the mid-1800s. Come and visit the Salzburger Museum and see artifacts exhibited from our collection. Then, walk up the stairs, visit the LRL and begin the journey of discovery. We can get you started on finding your roots, and you can take your first steps back into time and history. You might even decide to join if you are not already a member, or sign someone up (perhaps one of the young people in your family)!

Thank you very much for taking the time to read this short letter that I wrote just for you. Please feel free to visit. We are regularly open on Saturdays from 3 - 5 pm. One of our LRL volunteers can, on special occasions, set up a visit for those who are out of town or for groups including school groups. Come and visit and start that most wonderful of all journeys, the journey into your own past!

Before closing, I have one favor to ask any of you who are able to help with making the Georgia Salzburger Society even better. We could use volunteers to assist with a variety of jobs, from greeting guests and helping with groups to providing some hands on labor with grounds maintenance. Please consider joining our small active group of volunteers in making the GSS the best we can be!

THE PARSONAGE/GSS OFFICE
