President's Message

As most of you know, we have just held the "ribbon cutting" for the renovations to the old Fail House at Ebenezer this past Saturday. The Fail House is one of the oldest, if not THE oldest, residential houses in Effingham County. The Georgia Salzburger Society has invested a total of over \$45,000 for renovations, much of which was contributed by generous donors including members of the Atlanta Chapter. The Society also received a \$5,000 grant from the Preserving America Grant Program which was used toward replacement of the roof.

The renovations included re-glazing of the windows and adding new piers and beams to ensure the ongoing stability of the floors and framework of the house. In May, 2023, the Society Board voted to replace the reproduction wooden roof with a tin roof in order to protect the house and its contents, along with the kitchen, from any further water damage. It is known that the house had a tin roof for a long period during its history. The Society is proud to participate in the preservation of this historic treasure which offers a glimpse into life and conditions on the early Georgia frontier.

The Society has also, just this month, entered into a contract with the Franke Foundation in Halle, Germany, to complete the publication of the journals of Pastor Boltzius from the years 1746, 1757, 1759, and 1763. Small portions of the journals were not previously translated, but which contain interesting information, much of which has to do with the last days of Pastor Boltzius and his deteriorating health. The Franke Foundation has agreed to oversee the translation of the remaining portions of the journals from the old German script to a machine-readable version, and to publish the journals. Dr. Russell Kleckley will translate the work from modern German into English. This will complete this important work, providing a first-hand glimpse into life at Ebenezer during the colonial period.

CEMETERY SERVICE PROJECT

As part of the Heritage Day weekend, there will be a special service project at Jerusalem Lutheran Church cemetery on Saturday, September 2, beginning at 9 a.m.

Trae Zipperer, founder of By Memorial Day, Inc. and popular YouTube content provider, will host a veterans' graves recognition and tombstone cleaning project. Trae has received over five million views on his YouTube channel and has



appeared on the daytime talk show, *LIVE with Kelly and Mark*. He is an outspoken advocate for proper tombstone cleaning techniques and has helped to write the cleaning protocol set for the National Cemetery in Washington, D.C.

Trae is a descendant of dozens of Georgia Salzburger immigrants and has chosen this project to help honor our ancestors while recognizing the selflessness and sacrifice of the veterans who served.

The graves of the veterans buried at Jerusalem will be recognized, and Trae will do a demonstration showing the correct cleaning methods. All volunteers will then have the opportunity to clean tombstones. Please dress in comfortable work clothes. Because the cleaning protocol set by the National Cemetery Administration will be followed at this event, volunteers <u>do not need</u> to bring their own cleaning supplies. All supplies will be provided.

Charlotte Crabtree - Guest Speaker

Charlotte M. Crabtree will be the guest speaker for the Heritage Day 2023 program. Her presentation is entitled "And He Took the Cup: The Salzburger Chalice".

Charlotte's passion for silver began at age sixteen and, while shopping for her parents' silver anniversary present, she landed a job polishing silver. After graduating from the University of Georgia, Charlotte's interest in historical pieces and construction led her to Charleston and into partnership with her late husband, Al. They opened the Silver Vault of Charleston in 1995. She holds diplomas from the Gemological Institute of America, is a certified personal property appraiser, and is a qualified expert of antique silver by the South Carolina judicial system. She frequently writes, consults, and speaks throughout the country on the subject of historical silver.

Charlotte's two most recent articles were published in The Georgia Museum of Art magazine published by The University of Georgia Press: "Refined Reflections: Georgia Silver", and "And He Took the Cup: The Salzburger Chalice".

The Salzburger chalice was made of silver and bequeathed to the Salzburgers in Ebenezer by George Matthias Kiderlin, a twenty-year-old from Nordlingen who died in October 1741. The silver was sent to Augsburg where it was cast into the chalice, and gilded with two gold ducats also from Kiderlin. The finished product was brought to Ebenezer by Henry Melchior Muhlenberg in October of 1742.



My English roots go back to 1613, Jamestown, Virginia, and that was all I knew. Growing up in Pooler Georgia, I had no idea that I had German ancestry. Arriving at Ebenezer, I experienced a feeling of excitement as well as a sense of calm as though I had come home. A wonderfully helpful man, Mr. Roger Stephens, was working in the museum that day. He opened the "Red Book" Vol. II, page 1106, and found my Gruber family. Mr. Stephens then made a copy of page 1106. Our trip to Ebenezer was successful. Papa had proven that I was a Salzburger!

In 2009, at the age of 57, I became a member of The Georgia Salzburger Society. I found my Gruber family and it is one of which I am very proud to be a part. Without GSS I would not know Peter Gruber, his wife Maria, and their son John. Would I know of my Kalcher family? I might possibly know the Gruber and Kalcher pames but not their stories. It is through the

Kalcher names but not their stories. It is through the efforts of the Society that our heritage has been made known to us. Many times I have told others that we, the society, do not own their family genealogy but we do strive to maintain it for future descendants.
