


# Landing Day Celebration Saturday, March 9, 2024

### Welcome GSS Members and Friends.


Please make plans to attend the annual Landing Day celebration being held on Saturday, March 9, 2024 at Ebenezer, Georgia.

### President's Message

Things are progressing well at the Society. We received a number of generous donations. We received repeated annual donations from the Derst Foundation, Berrien and Nancy Zettler, and Penny Scarpucci. We have also received a \$5,000 stock donation from Michelle Burns, matched by her employer for an additional \$5,000, Goldman Sachs. This was donated by Michelle in memory of her friend and former GSS President, Gregory E. Arnsdorff. A generous \$2,500 donation was received from Krista Seckinger, the daughter of Calvin Seckinger.

Work in the old parsonage has continued, including insulation in the attic which was installed at the end of January. The GAC /GSS Board has donated \$500 for the project.

Dr. Kleckley has finished the first draft of the 1757 fragment of the journal of Pastor Bolzius. That portion covers the months of February and March of 1757. The 1746 first draft was completed in the fall of 2023.

Dr. Hommel completed his transcriptions of all of the journal fragments in December 2023, and that has now been paid for in full by the Society.

Board members have been invited to participate in the second annual Genealogy Fair hosted by the **Bulloch County Genealogy and Local History** Coordinator, Lillian Wingate. The dates are March 22 and 23. Several workshops dealing with genealogy are also being planned at Ebenezer on various Saturdays throughout the year.

The fence along the highway has now been completed as well.

The Board looks forward to seeing all of you at Landing Day on March 9. There will be a very interesting talk by Dan Elliott, the archaeologist, on the role of Ebenezer in the American Revolution. Dan's wife, Rita Elliott, will have an archaeological 2 display for review as well. ~ Noble Boykin

Then Jesus went thence, and departed into the coasts [borders] of Tyre and Sidon. (Mathew 15:21 KJV).

This journey was Christ's only travel from the land of Israel, leaving Capernaum (likely) and coming to the fringe of Phoenician lands. In his journal for that day, Pastor Bolzius saw a parallel for his congregation:

"Praise be to God who has let us spend this **Reminiscere Sunday** on the water. Again He has done great things for us. He refreshed our bodies with sound food and drink; and everyone on the ship was in good spirits because we were lying off the shores of our dear Georgia on a beautifully calm sea listening to the birds singing sweetly. It was very edifying for us to come to the border of Georgia on this day, as the Gospel teaches us that Jesus went to the border of the heathen lands after having suffered much discomfort and persecution from His own countrymen."

• The First Salzburger Transport reached Savannah on the Tuesday, the 12<sup>th</sup> of March, 1734. This year of 2024 we celebrate the 290<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of their **LANDING DAY**. The new Georgia settlers made frequent use of the passage from 1 Samuel (and others) which honors God for His doing "great things for us": 'Thus far the Lord has helped us.' From that same comforting Scripture, our exiles were granted to name their new home **Ebenezer**, for He is our **Stone of Help**. ~ JohnRobert Peavy

### BACKGROUND FOR OUR MARCH GATHERING — APPROACHING GEORGIA

Following the Winter 1731–1732 expulsion, our congregation, founded in Augsburg in October of 1732, met their two pastors (from Halle) at Rotterdam; the First Transport then endured a three-week passage through the English Channel (2–21 December 1733), the rough weather giving them a foretaste of their nine-week ocean voyage. The ship *Purysburg* left England 8 January 1734. As our exiles near the end of their Atlantic trek, we'll look here at a few translated travel journal entries, and related Scripture.

- [Friday, 1st of March 1734] "As Samuel erected a Pillar which he called **Ebenezer**; so did we also erect in our Hearts an eternal Memorial of the divine Favours."

Then Samuel tooke a stone, and set it betweene Mizpeh and Shen, and called the name of it **Eben-Ezer**, saying, Hitherto hath the Lord [YHWH] helped vs. 1 Samuel 7:12 KJV 1611

- [Sunday morning, the 3<sup>rd</sup>] Pastor Bolzius records that God provided:
- "... much edification from His Word and gave us super abundant consolation in our distressing situation. Holy Writ and the comforting verses therein are so blessed for us by our Father in Heaven that we often derive a heavenly pleasure from them and become strengthened in all of our trials of body and soul. ... we will record them [a list of scripture passages, including I Samuel 7:12].

### A New Wooden Fence

In the fall of 2022, Apple Productions removed the chain link fence in front of the GSS Museum and parsonage. They gave GSS generous donations to replace the chain link fence. GSS made an agreement with the Jerusalem Lutheran Church to split the cost. Jason Hurst of Life Edge Sawyers rough cut and treated the wood, and in December 2023, Lance Miller installed the wooden fence starting from Jerusalem Lutheran Church yard and extending it to the end of the Ebenezer grounds. # Letter From the Desk of Thomas Govenstein

### **Greetings, Cousins!**

The Loest Research Library continues with Salzburger research, and I would like to tell of a special visitor we had in December. Many of you are familiar with ancestry.com,

a popular genealogy focused website. The Salzburger Society and the Loest Research Library was honored to have Dr. Janette Silverman, a Senior Genealogist Research Team Manager at AncestryProGenealogists, visit the library recently to do research.

The research focused on John Caspar Waldhauer and his descendants. John Caspar Waldhauer was born in 1690 and died in Ebenezer on December 3, 1766. John and his family emigrated to the colony of Georgia with what is known as the 4th Paletine group on the 11th transport, the ship "Judith". It arrived in Savannah on January 11, 1746. As of 2003, his descendants for the 11th generation number over 385.

Dr. Silverman spent an afternoon in our research library searching for those often hard to find bits and pieces that help flesh out the story and give depth



and meaning to a family. Dr. Silverman, along with a traveling companion, Nancy Blanton, also enjoyed looking at the collections in the museum and toured the grounds. We look forward to the outcome of Dr. Silverman's research. Along with information she has already provided to us, she will be forwarding her findings to the Georgia Salzburger Society.

I hope this will give you, the readers, an idea of how the Society continues to build on the knowledge gained by serious research from

around the country, and around the world. Thank you, Dr. Silverman, for your work and for visiting the Loest Research Library and the town of Ebenezer.

# Landing Day Speaker: Daniel T. Elliott

Daniel T. Elliott is a native Georgian and currently resides with his wife and colleague, Rita Folse Elliott, in Rincon, Georgia. He has more than 47 years as a historical archaeologist with primary focus in the southeastern United States. He is also extensively versed in prehistoric archaeology. Mr. Elliott has expertise in conflict archaeology, remote sensing survey (GPR), settlement patterning, trade and exchange networks, archaic period studies, and 18th and



early 19th century studies. For the past two decades Mr. Elliott has served as President of the LAMAR Institute, Inc., a non-profit research group based in Savannah, Georgia. Dan received the Lifetime Achievement Award in Archaeology in 2014 from the Southern Campaign of the American Revolution. Mr. Elliott has directed major archaeological projects at Ebenezer, as well as other historical sites across

Georgia. Mr. Elliott is attempting to be semi-retired, although he continues to work on several LAMAR Institute projects in Georgia and South Carolina. 9




