## Landing Day Celebration - March 8, 2025

Please plan to attend the annual Landing Day celebration on **Saturday, March 8, 2025**.

The day begins at 10 a.m. All GSS buildings and Jerusalem Lutheran

Church will be open. Take a tour, stroll the grounds, visit with cousins, and meet new ones!


From **11 a.m. to 1 p.m.**, a traditional lunch of good rice soup will be served in the church social hall. Lunch costs **\$10** and includes soup, dessert, and a drink. All proceeds from lunch sales will benefit the **GSS general operating fund**.

At 1 p.m., GSS buildings will close, and the Memorial and Thanksgiving Service will begin in the church sanctuary. This tradition dates back to March 1735—290 years ago!

During the service, there will be a moment of silence, followed by the reading of names of recently deceased GSS members, with the bells of Jerusalem tolling in their honor.

The **annual business meeting** will immediately follow the church service. Our **special speaker** will be **Dr. Brent W. Tharp**, Director of the Georgia

Southern University Museum and adjunct assistant professor in the Department of History. His presentation, "Centuries of Tradition and Adaptation," will explore how Native Americans in southeastern Georgia developed enduring traditions and adapted to significant changes in environment, health, technology, and culture. Dr. Tharp will highlight much of this history as reflected in the collections and exhibits of the Georgia Southern Museum.



Following the presentation, the **new slate of officers and directors** will be elected and installed.

At **3 p.m.**, a **reception** will be held in the **GSS Parsonage** to honor the guest speaker and recognize both incoming and outgoing Board members. Cake and punch will be served. ~ Erika Bragg

## President's Message

Everyone, including all our staff and volunteers, has been very busy at the Society this winter. We are now, of course, preparing for the Landing Day Celebration in March. Our program for Landing Day will focus on Native Americans in this area and their relationship to the Salzburgers at Ebenezer. At least one Euchee descendant from Oklahoma has reached out, and she is planning to attend our Landing Day Celebration at her own expense. She is one of the Euchee tribe members who participated in the Heritage Day Celebration approximately ten years ago, when a number of their tribe from Oklahoma visited Ebenezer.

She has also reached out to others in the Euchee community to organize another group trip, this time involving older members who have expressed their desire to see their tribal homeland in Southeast Georgia.

We are also beginning to organize plans for the Centennial Celebration of the Society, tentatively scheduled to take place on Heritage Day weekend. We are planning a dinner and the erection of a monument to mark the occasion. Hopefully, the monument will be completed in time for the dedication ceremony. Of course, this will depend on the availability of the stone and the work schedule at the stone quarry.

At this time, all is well at the Society. We have received funds from the insurance carrier for most, if not all, of the damage to the Society's property caused by Hurricane Helene. (Continued on page 10)

# GSS Research Committee: Erika Bragg - Chair Kraer and Rau Genealogy

**Kraer and Rau Genealogy Corrections** 

On February 8, 2025, the GSS Board voted to make corrections to the genealogy recognized by the Society.

• The first change was made to the immigrant ancestor of the Kraer/ Kroehr family. Peter Kraer had been named the ancestor of the line, even though he never left Salzburg. Peter was baptized on November 14, 1678, and died on January 24, 1748, in the county of Saalfelden. He married, for the third time, Barbara Rohrmoser on October 19, 1715. Pastor Boltzius reported that Barbara Rohrmoser Kraer "tearfully but willingly left her husband, with whom she had had happy days in Salzburg, and her children, one of whom was still nursing." Maria Kraer, the matriarch of the (Peter) Gruber line, left Salzburg as a 28-year-old single woman. She was accompanied by her stepmother, Barbara, and two of her younger sisters, Catharina and Gertraud.

The GSS Board voted to recognize Maria Kraer as the Georgia Salzburger immigrant ancestor in place of her father, Peter Kraer, who lived and died in the town of his birth.

• The second change was made to the immigrant ancestor of the Rau family. Caspar Rau had been named the ancestor of the line, even though he died years before his family left Langenau. Caspar Rau was baptized on March 20, 1688, and died on July 31, 1747. He married Anna Remshardt on May 2, 1721.

Anna Rau came to Georgia with the Third Swabian Transport in 1752. She arrived with five of her adult children: Elisabetha, Maria, Georg, Barbara, and Anna Catharina. Also on the transport were Sebastian and Ursula Fetzer and their two daughters. Ursula Rau Fetzer was the half-sister of the Rau children and the stepdaughter of the widow Rau. Anna Rau was granted 100 acres of land on November 29, 1752, in Halifax, along with others from the Third Swabian Transport. She was referred to as "the widow Rau" by the pastor. On April 9, 1759, "the old sick widow from Langenau, Anna Rau," called for the pastor to visit her. On April 11, "the sixty-year-old widow, Anna Rau, died yesterday morning, accompanied by the prayers of her children."

The GSS Board voted to recognize Anna Remshardt Rau as the Georgia Salzburger immigrant ancestor in place of her husband, Caspar Rau, who had died and been buried five years before Anna came to Georgia.

#### **Greetings Cousins!**

The Loest Research Library, the Georgia Salzburger Society, and you! As I hope you are aware, we have a Landing Day celebration coming up on March 8, and you are not only cordially invited—you are greatly needed to make Landing Day complete.

As always, the Loest Research Library (LRL) has much to offer visitors, and I would like to take some time to speak to the parents of teenagers. I am well aware of the lack of interest many teens exhibit when it comes to seeking out and learning about their genealogical past. The big question many teens (and others as well!) have is: "Why should I care? After all, all of my ancestors are dead." That is a valid question, and I would like to offer a few answers to help spark an interest in those "dead ancestors."

First, learning about your family's history helps you understand your own identity, connect with your family, and appreciate your heritage. By looking into the past, you can strengthen relationships with relatives close to you and share common stories. Learning about the struggles your ancestors faced can provide valuable life lessons about resilience, hard work, and perseverance.

Another important aspect of genealogy involves family health and personal growth. Knowing the medical history of past generations can offer insight into the current health and well-being of today's family. DNA studies, along with written and oral histories, provide an amazing amount of health data. Exploring your ancestry also fosters curiosity, research skills, historical awareness, and even a passion for travel.

Finally, teens can build a "storybook" of the histories handed down by parents, grandparents, and other extended family members. Family reunions become more than just gatherings with food—they become opportunities to preserve family stories.
