President's Message

The attention of the Society has now turned to preparing for the Heritage Day Celebration on Labor Day, as well as plans for the Centennial Celebration of the Society scheduled for that same weekend. The Society has contracted to acquire and place a large granite stone to commemorate the 100th Anniversary of the Society founded in 1925. The plan is to have the stone placed near the museum with a bronze plaque in commemoration of the founding.

The Board requests that anyone who desires to make a contribution toward the purchase of the stone and plaque (approximately \$8,500) to contact Jennifer in the Society's office. The Society intends to recognize contributors to this fund at the Centennial celebration.

On another note, the Board has also voted to approve partial funding of a new joint publication by the Society and the Francke Foundation in Germany. This proposal has been agreed to by the Board of the Salzburger Society as well as the Francke Foundation through Prof. Dr. Thomas Müller-Bahlke . The publication will include letters from Pastors Herman Heinrick Lemke, Christian Rabenhorst, and Christoph Frederick Triebner. There are a total of one hundred previously unpublished letters and a travel diary to be included.

As a Society, we have previously focused on the first and last of the pastors supplied from Halle and the Francke Foundation. This new publication will shift focus to the pastors in the interim period which includes The American Revolution. In particular, the disputes between Pastors Rabenhorst and Triebner which took place during The American Revolution, (Continued on page 5)

In Memoriam

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FROM THE DESK OF THOMAS GROVENSTEIN Loest Research Librarian

Greetings Cousins!

Spring is in the air, and visitors are showing up at Ebenezer and the Loest Research Library. While it is always of great interest and excitement to show visitors the steps needed to find that one elusive piece of information that completes a limb of the Family Tree, there are other areas that warrant additional study. To assist with this, we have perhaps the most important books in the library. They come from the first pastors who were a part of Ebenezer from 1734 onward.


One reason the writings and letters of these holy men were and are so important is that the daily life of the settlement of Ebenezer was chronicled in their pages. Births, marriages, baptisms, and deaths were not only a part of day to day life, they were an integral part of church life. While some of the writing is a bit difficult to get through, the rich contents and information are well worth the effort. There are six German pastors on whom the citizens of Ebenezer depended.

Three of the men, Lemke, Rabenhorst, and Triebner, have yet to have their writings published, but the other three have not only been published, but their writings are a cornerstone of the Loest Research Library (LRL).

The first, Johann Martin Boltzius (Bolzius), arrived with the first settlers in Ebenezer in early March of 1734. It was his leadership that brought them to a new world and saw them through the many trials of settling a raw land. The

writings that Pastor Boltzius produced are available for your study at the LRL using the *Letters of Johann Martin Boltzius* and the *Detailed Reports*.

During this time, and as Boltzius carried on the duties of Senior Pastor, his understudy, Israel Christian Gronau, a young man of about 20, was given the title of Parish Junior and Catechist. His main job was to teach the children the "Three Rs" and to be their catechism teacher; he thus established Georgia's first Sunday School in 1734. Although Mr. Gronau died in 1745 at the relatively young age of 30, he also has writings contained in the *Detailed Reports.* (Continued on page 9)

(Continued from page 3) Although Mr. Gronau died in 1745 at the relatively young age of 30, he also has writings contained in the *Detailed Reports.* The third published pastor, Johann Ernst Bergmann, arrived in Ebenezer around 1786, 21 years after Boltzius died. While Pastor Bergmann did not keep a journal like Pastor Boltzius, he wrote numerous letters, and many of those survived. The LRL is fortunate to have a relatively recent addition to its shelves in the collection *The Letters of Johann Ernst Bergmann*. These three men give you, the visitor to the LRL, an amazing opportunity to reach back into the sands of time and read the works of the men who led your ancestors from a land of Alpine mountains to a lowland swamp far removed from all they had known.

If you are reading this letter, you are part of a great community that made its mark on the shores of a new land. We hope to see you soon at Ebenezer! ~ Tom Grovenstein



Nathaniel Nungayor Painting Restoration

The GSS was honored to be a 2024 Americana Corner Preserving America Grant recipient. The grant was used to restore the painting of Nathaniel Nungazer (1796–1870) to mitigate damage from mold growing on its surface. Art Conservationist Larry Shutts of Atlanta was contracted to complete the preservation of the portrait.



According to Mr. Shutts: All frame repairs have been completed, greatly improving the overall appearance. As much mold as possible was carefully removed. The mold had formed a hard crust that was difficult to reduce without risking damage to the unvarnished painting. Over decades, it had caused significant deterioration by directly consuming the paint. Despite the damage, the piece cleaned up remarkably well—about 80% improved. The coat's details now stand out, the face is clear, and the shirt appears bright.

treasures around Ebenezer's buildings, grounds, and

general. Of the one hundred documents, seventy are in the Francke Foundation's archive, and thirty documents are kept in the Berlin State Library. We have also obtained permission to include in that edition the previously-unknown letter from Ebenezer Community leaders to Pastor Mühlenberg which is held by the German Society of Pennsylvania.

The project is scheduled to commence in early 2026 with the publication slated to be completed within four years.

The projected cost for this publication project is substantial, \$68,952, but it is to be spread over four years. The Francke Foundation has agreed to produce the publication and handle all distribution. It is also anticipated that Professor Dr. Russell Kleckley will be in charge of the translation from old German to modern English.

As one can determine, this is a substantial project but thankfully, the most of same can be spread over four years, as referenced. The Board believes that a number of individuals will be interested in assisting with the raising of these funds. It should be noted that the family of the late Pastor and past president of the Society, Donald Hanberry, has agreed to make a substantial contribution in his memory toward this project which hopefully will cover the first year's costs.


We are also formulating a committee, much like a church stewardship committee, to attempt to raise funds for this worthwhile historical project. Of course, publication of the early letters and documents associated with the Salzburgers at Ebenezer is one of the primary purposes of the Society as set forth in our Constitution and founding documents. With this project, the Society will have published all the correspondence between the pastors of Ebenezer and the benefactors in Halle.


